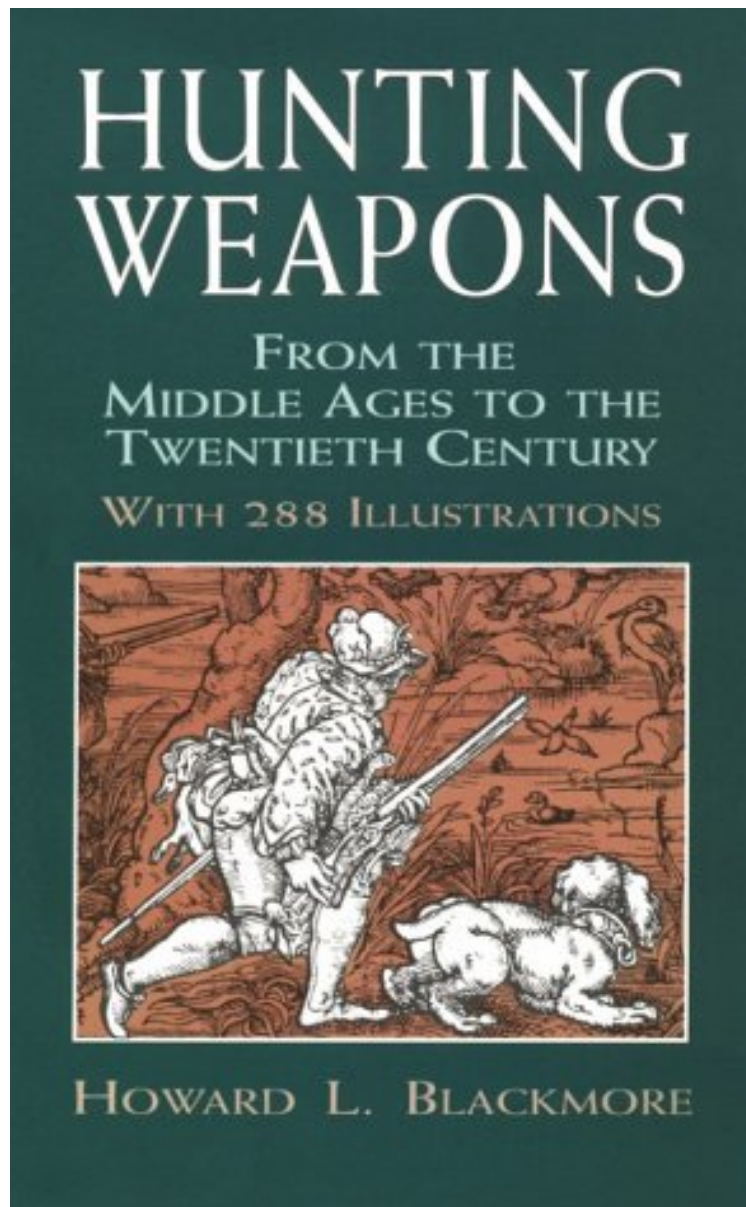

Hunting WeaponsBy Sam AdamsThis is a 2000 Dover reprint of the original 1971 publication. Blackmore writes about swords, knives and bayonets, bows, crossbows, guns, and miscellaneous weapons. As the title indicates, the book is on hunting weapons, and does not include discussion of the military or self-defense use of them. Illustrations from old woodcuts or other artistic renderings are the main visual reference, but the book also includes 151 photos gathered together in the back pages. In the firearms chapter, Blackmore is not concerned with patent dates or technical details, or with tracing the network of developments. The book is also not a history of hunting although there are descriptions of hunting methods. There are ample quotations from early authors.

Detailed, comprehensive account of swords, knives and bayonets, staff weapons, bows, crossbows, guns and other miscellaneous arms — dating from the Middle Ages to modern times. Over 280 contemporary illustrations catalog the spear of a Roman hunter, a medieval broad arrow, a harpoon gun fired by whalers, and much else.
