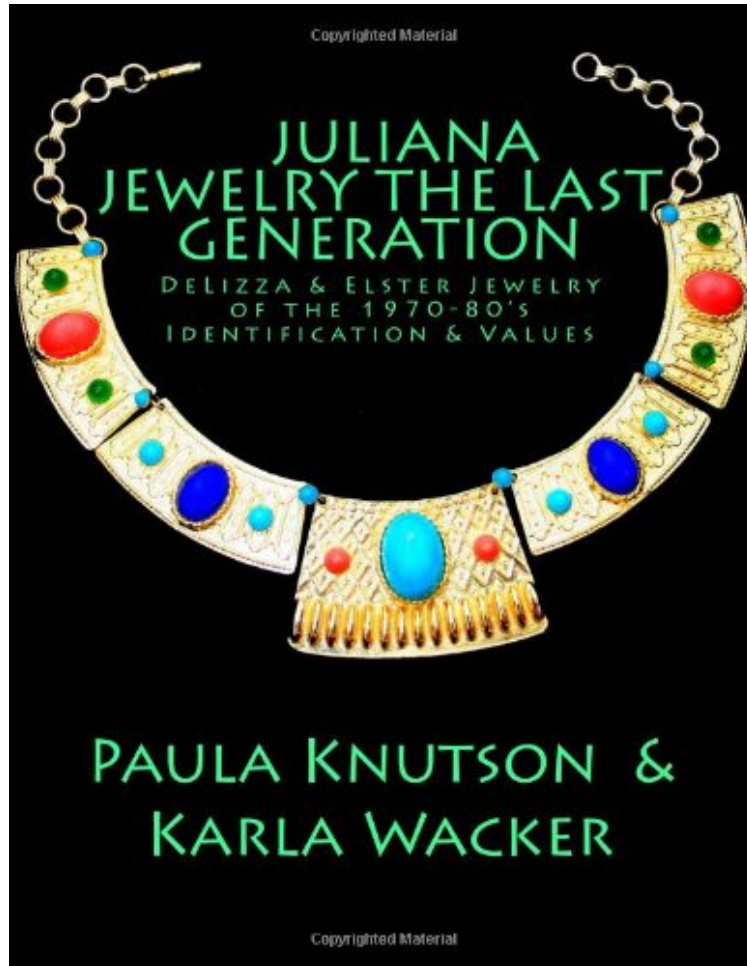


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Juliana Jewelry - The Last Generation

Its value lies in identifying the jewelry of DeLizza and Elster as the company followed jewelry trends in the 1970's and 1980's in order to stay in business. The photographs could be clearer, but still the items were easy to recognize and helpful in identifying pieces that one would not think to have been produced by the company. The book also contains photos of styles from the 1950's and 1960's, but those have been well documented before.
