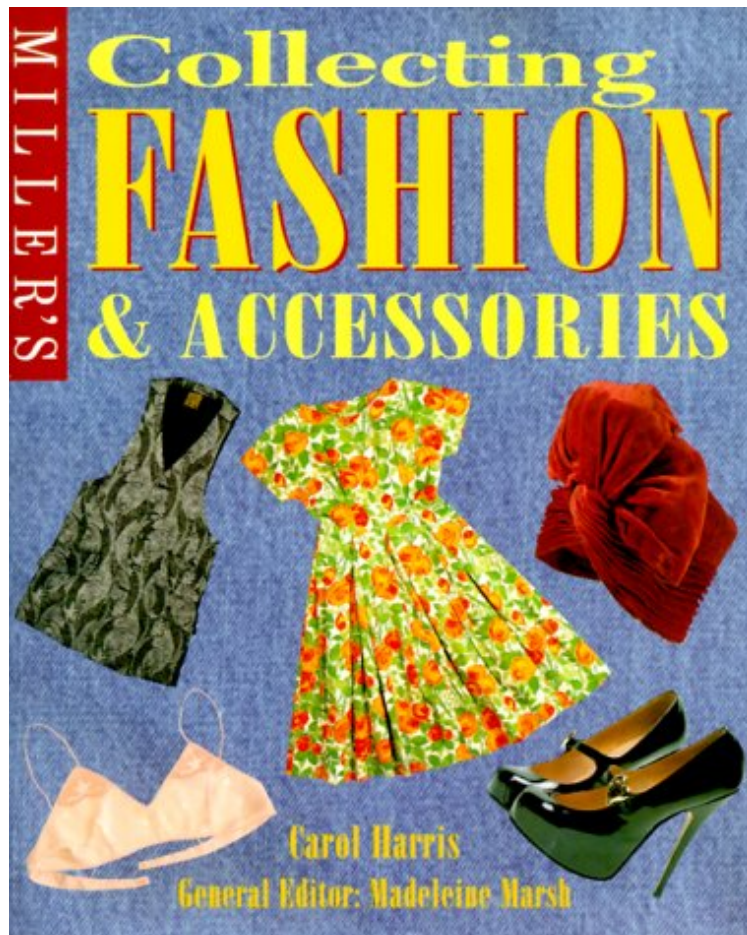

This accessible book takes a close look at this increasingly popular area of collecting, covering styles from the very beginning of the century to the present day. For ease of reference, this book is divided into decades and then subdivided into daywear, evening wear, underwear, accessories and menswear, with special sections on unisex clothing included under the 1970s and 1990s. It features information on key designers and trends and is packed with handy tips on how to spot a bargain. Practical advice on where to buy is also included, along with information on how to care for your collection, a glossary of useful terms and suggestions for further reading.

From Library Journal The publisher's latest collectible guide is an eye-catching look at fashions. Harris, a British fashion collector and writer, discusses clothing from an English perspective, but her examples are comparable to American styles. Price values for approximately 300 pieces of vintage clothing are listed in both pounds and dollars. Examples of early fashions (pre-1920s) as well as styles from each decade from the 1920s through the 1990s, shown in color photographs, cover day wear, evening wear, lingerie, accessories, men's wear, and unisex clothing. The book includes such fashion finds as lucite mules, Mary Quant stockings, Afghan coats, and bowling shirts. Also included are brief but useful sections on places to buy vintage in Great Britain and how to care for your vintage clothing as well as a fashion chronology. Though readers expecting a substantial text will be disappointed, the whimsical photos make this a visually pleasing book. Recommended for public libraries.
