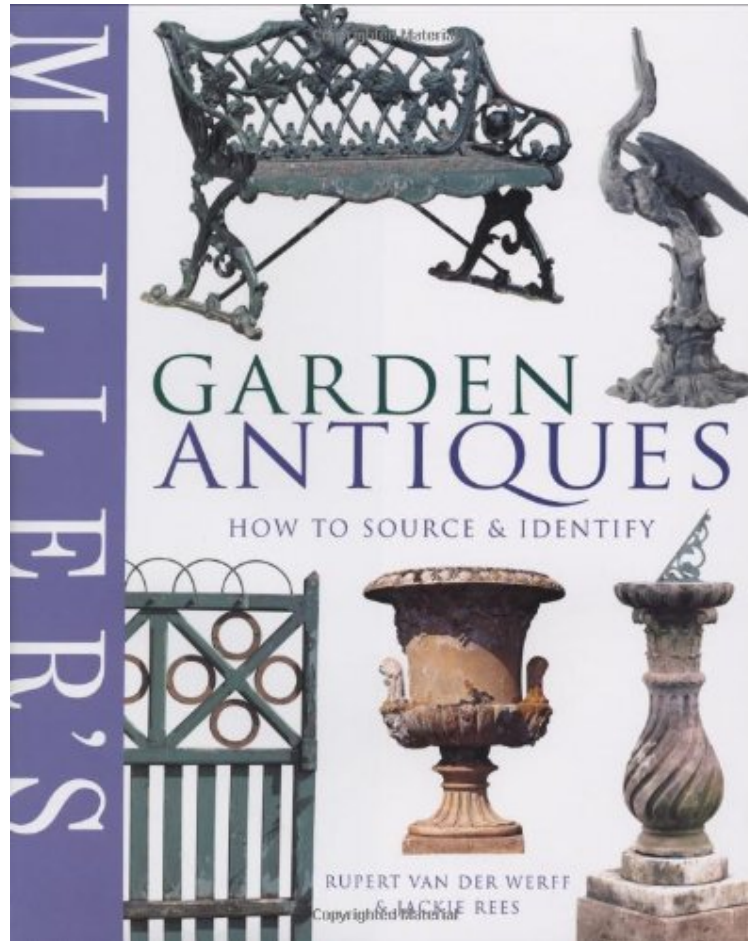

The authors give a very brief description of the history of each type of ornament, how it was used in a garden, and how to identify a good quality item. The color photos are high quality, and comments about each photos reinforces the authors' expertise.The only slight drawback is that the prices are out of date (not surprising in a book of this type) and the sources given in the index are probably dated too. They're also mostly British (as is the book.)
